Overview

The Cannon Beach Academy Vision:

It is our vision to create and operate a school that will provide our children skill, knowledge and compassion they will need to succeed in life.

The Cannon Beach Academy Mission Statement:

Our mission is to provide expanded high quality educational choices within the public school system. The Cannon Beach Academy shall strive to provide:

- a balanced education to nurture the development of the whole child, encouraging each child to become a life-long learner and a benefit to society. The school places equal emphasis on a solid academic foundation, artistic expression, attention to the inner emotional life of each child, social development and responsibility, cultural diversity, a healthy lifestyle and appreciation of the environment and the arts.
- a focus on children who have been historically underserved, due to factors such as race, ethnicity, culture and socioeconomic background.
- opportunities for parents and members of the community to be directly involved in the school operation and make significant contributions to their children's educational environment.

History of the School:

Our school was born out of a true "grassroots" movement that began in 2011 when the Cannon Beach City Council voiced concerns over the existing Cannon Beach Elementary School's location, which was in the tsunami inundation zone. A task force of ten members was formed with the intent of finding a new location for the elementary school. These volunteers worked diligently over the next eighteen months, identified a new location for the school and were in negotiations with the Seaside School District (SSD) for a plan to move the district school to this new site. However, in May of 2013, the SSD school board voted to close the Cannon Beach Elementary School due to budget constraints. After this announcement, parents and community members joined together to form The Cannon Beach Academy to help keep a school in our community. We opened our doors, as a K-2 school, with 22 students in September, 2017. We have grown over the past five years and now we serve 44 students in grades K-5. This has all been made possible because of the hundreds of volunteers, donors and community members who support our school.

Intro/Letter from the Director:

Seaside School District,

On behalf of Cannon Beach Academy, I want to thank you for being our sponsoring school district and approving our Charter Renewal for the next five years. We are grateful for the opportunity to serve kids within the community of Cannon Beach and its surrounding areas. The past year has been especially challenging with the change of staff during the 2022-2023 school year and into this new school year, but we are encouraged and excited for the future of our little school.

I will do my best to encapsulate the previous school year, as I just recently accepted the position of Interim Director for the 2023-2024 school year. We had several special events happen over the course of the 2022-2023 school year. The fifth graders had the opportunity to attend Outdoor School with the fifth graders from Pacific Ridge in October. It was a fun and memorable time for all. The third and fourth graders from my class are excited about the opportunity to go in the future. On December 3rd, CBA participated in the Cannon Beach Lamplighting Ceremony. Our students sang Christmas carols, then two of our fifth graders helped light the Lamp in Sandpiper Square. This is a long standing tradition and much of the community

attends this festive event. We had our annual Winter Music Program at the Community Church on December 14. Refreshments and hot cocoa were served before the concert. Most of our families attended this special event. In January, we had a visit from the Coast Watch Program to give a demonstration. Amy Rider and her kindergarten class spent the rest of the school year going on beach walks and supplying data for this wonderful program. The fifth graders participated in STARBASE at Camp Rilea in January and February where they had some amazing STEM-related lessons. In February, we had guest author Nanette Heffernan come and share her book *Earth Hour* with the school. She provided the materials and helped the third through fifth grade students create a solar lamp out of recycled materials. On March 8th, I had a very exciting phone call with The Mr. Brown! For SEL, we watch Mr. Brown videos (https://www.thechoosewellprogram.com/). The kids love Mr. Brown and are constantly quoting his words of wisdom: When you make better choices, you will live a better life. Mr. Brown even sent CBA a personalized video (https://youtu.be/W4LtnLU8x0k)! What an exciting day that was! In March, Dawn Jay and Leticia Campos took their team of OBOB (Oregon Battle of the Books) for State Competition in Salem. April was a busy month. Our PTO put on an Easter Egg Hunt at a local park; we planted trees with the City of Cannon Beach for Earth Day; Cannon Beach Art Association hosted an Art Day for all of the students; and the 3-5th graders went on a field trip to the Maritime Museum in Astoria to see the Coast Guard ships. On May 13th, the Running Club participated in their first 5K run in Astoria. We had so much fun we did another one in Cannon Beach in June as a part of the Sand Castle Competition. We were able to get donations to purchase the kids brand new running shoes and pay for both registration fees. We hosted an Open House on May 13th for families of incoming kindergartners and potential new families. The PTO planned a Carnival for our families on June 2nd. It was very well attended and everyone had a wonderful time eating BBQ'd hotdogs, jumping in the bounce house, and playing all of the games. The PTO also put on a 5th Grade Graduation Party at Gearhart Bowl for our fifth graders. We ended the school year with a walk down to Haystack Rock for a learning experience with the Haystack Awareness Program.

I am so grateful to be at a school where we have these fun and memorable opportunities for our students and their families. Thank you for your continued support.




Staff retention has been high. All current staff has been retained and with the exception of Kindergarten.

Professional Development:

During the summer, teachers attend a week-long conference at the National Institute of Direct Instruction (NIFDI). This conference provides training on curriculum for new staff, or for staff who are teaching new material as well as providing support for experienced teachers in our program. The conference also teaches staff how to analyze data for the Direct Instruction (DI) program.

Teaching staff meets weekly for one hour for professional development. This allows staff to develop the knowledge and skills they need to address students' learning challenges. Additionally, the professional development time is used to improve instruction. During the 2022-2023 school year, discussion groups were held to talk about challenging situations in the classroom, which allowed for collaboration on how to address such issues.

Staff also met on a monthly basis to discuss progress in the DI program. These meetings evaluated weekly lesson progress, student test analysis, and any regrouping that may be needed.

Throughout the year during inservice days, teachers were given additional training on the referral process for Special Education, ELD, Smarter Balance, and ELPA.

Curriculum/Programs

Education Program Description:

The Cannon Beach Academy consists of 2 successfully blended classrooms and one kindergarten classroom. Ms. Kiffe was the core teacher for Grades 3-5. Mrs. Jay was the core teacher for first and second grade. Ms. Rider was the core teacher for kindergarten. Each class has a maximum of 25 students.

For core academics (reading and math), Mrs. Leticia Campos, Mrs. Barker, and Mr. Hull teach small groups alongside Ms. Kiffe, Mrs. Jay, and Ms. Rider. This allows students who need instruction above or below his/her grade level to "walk to reading" or "walk to math." It also gives the ability to give instruction at multiple skill levels with more minutes of focus per student. Mrs. Leticia Campos is also the ELD teacher and Spanish teacher.

Direct Instruction is used for reading, academic language, and math. Core Knowledge is used for Social Studies. Mystery Science is used for Science. The Great Body Shop and Second Step is used for Health and SEL. Rockalingua is used for Spanish. National Geographic Reach is used for the ELD program. Teachers create plans for Art, Music, and PE.

Student Achievement Measures

Statewide Assessment Scores

The Smarter Balanced Assessment was given to students in grade 3, 4, and 5. Sample size is too small to be analyzed by the Oregon Department of Education with regards to comparisons to the Seaside School District, or disaggregated data. The charts and graphs below report the results of the English Language Arts (ELA) and Math tests.

Assessment Results Analysis:

For ELA, nine of the sixteen students who were assessed met or exceeded the achievement standard (level 3 or higher, 56%), and five nearly met the standard (31%). We will analyze which specific areas of the ELA test students scored lower and make sure to address those areas in our teaching.


For Math, three of the sixteen students met the achievement standard (level 3 or higher, 19%), and seven students nearly met (44%). We will analyze which specific areas of the math test students scored lower and make sure to address those areas in our teaching.

STAR Assessment:

The Cannon Beach Academy administers the STAR tests at least three times per year to measure growth. The following charts below show the number of students at each percentile rank, who participated in the testing. Also noted is the overall percentile rank for each test. This data reflects the end of the year scores.


Star Early Literacy is a customized reading test for students to take on a computer. The test is designed for students in grades pre-K through 3 (beginning readers who do not yet read independently or need early literacy skills assessed).

STAR Early Literacy Overall Median Percentile Rank: 55, Grades K-2. 25 students total.




STAR Reading is a customized reading test for students to take on a computer. The test is designed for students in grades 3-12.

STAR Reading Overall Median Percentile Rank: 52, grades 3-5. 18 students total.



STAR Math is a customized math test for students to take on a computer. The test is designed for students grades 1-12 (also for students in kindergarten who have basic reading and math skills).

STAR Math Overall Median Percentile Rank: 54, Grades 1-5. 39 students total.



The 2022-23 school year was the fifth year using this assessment. Growth rates are reported from Fall 2022 to Spring 2023. The projected Student Growth Percentile (SGP) is 50.

Early Literacy SGP: 44 Reading SGP: 66 Math SGP: 62

Assessment Results Analysis:

We need to direct additional attention on the students who fall below the 25th percentile. STAR allows teachers to print reports that determine students academic strengths and areas of need. For individual students who fall below the 25th percentile, teachers can target areas of need during independent work time or small group instruction.

Additionally, we need to provide extra attention to those students who are in first or second grade but still haven't mastered the early literacy skills to take the standard reading test. These students are already in an extra reading class, and are in a reading class that is below their grade level in order to boost confidence and knowledge.

Overall, our growth rates for early literacy, reading, and math are at or above expected growth.

Assessment Results Analysis:

We need to work closely with the students to develop skills to help them be proficient.

Student Clubs:

- Running Club Students from kindergarten through 5th grade met every Thursday
 after school from 3:15 to 4:30 to participate in Running Club. Club started with a
 healthy snack followed by some stretching. We averaged running about a mile each
 week leading up to our first 5K run which took place in Astoria on May 13th. The
 students participated in a second 5K run in Cannon Beach on June 11th. This club
 served 17 students.
- Battle of the Books Club Students in 3rd grade to 5th grade met every Monday
 after school from 3:15 to 4:30 to participate in The Battle of the Books. We invited
 some 2nd graders who were interested in reading the books and helping prepare the
 students who could compete. The competition was held in March of 2023. This club
 served 9 students.
- Dungeons & Dragons Club Students in 3rd grade to 5th grade met every
 Tuesday after school from 3:15 to 4:30 to engage in a campaign of Dungeons &
 Dragons. This year we began our journey at the prestigious Champion Builders
 Academia (or CBA for short) to build the young heroes of tomorrow. This activity
 builds on STEM, Mathematics, social emotional skills, note-taking, and roll-playing.
 This club met for the entire school year. This club served 10 students.

Facilities

Overview:

The Cannon Beach Academy currently leases the building from the City of Cannon Beach.

The building is approximately 2000 square feet and was previously used by the former Children's Center preschool and daycare. The building was vacant for approximately one year before we moved in. Improvements include: a fire suppression system, roofing and gutter repairs, a playground, as well as routine upkeep to landscaping, parking lot and general building.

Due to the school's proximity to the beach, teachers take advantage of PE time to walk to the beach if the weather and surf permit.

The school is approximately 50 feet above sea level. The evacuation route takes students to the West end of the property, across Highway 101, and into the neighboring housing development to the rally point, which is approximately 100 feet above sea level.
